Hope ● Peace ● Joy ● Love

That was Advent (those four words). I hope that you internalized them. It didn't last long for me and I was off chasing other things, but it is really important that we use those four words just like we do with “Worship, Community Outreach, and Service” because those four words along with “Love God and Love Neighbor” will be how we finally reach our goal of the “Big Three” as we look to our future. And what follows is what I was off chasing.

“Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way.” Matthew 1:18. **An angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph and said to him, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife for she will bear a son and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins.**

If you were to look at the actual text of Matthew 1:18-25, you would see that verse 18 is exactly as I printed it above, but I took some literary license on that next sentence above.

Now if I were to look at Luke's story of the angel coming to Mary, it might be described this way: **An angel of the Lord came to Mary and said to Mary, you have found favor with God and you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus.**

Those two sentences in bold print seem so simple and sometime that is all we hear when we read the accounts in both Matthew and Luke, but as we all know, “there is the rest of the story,” as Paul Harvey says. But if we take those two sentences in bold print and run with them (and for us, sometimes that's all we need to know), we have not done justice to what Mary and Joseph had to go through in this little village of Nazareth.

We do know the rest of the story and the only way we can explain it is that it is God's plan, but there is more to the story. Do you really think that their neighbors bought this story of God coming to both of them and telling them what He had done. I'm guessing not! If Nazareth was anything like my farming community home town of Casey, Iowa, there were lots of tongues wagging, and lots of fingers pointing at them and I'm guessing this scandal was the talk of the town.

Why do I bring this up? It bothers me that we don't really understand what Mary and Joseph went through as major players in God's plan of bringing his son Jesus into the world to die for your sins and mine, then three days later raising him from the dead that we might have eternal life.

The descriptions in both Matthew and Luke of "How the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way" seem so simple and straight forward, and once you and I know the rest of the story, it allows us to just breeze past what Mary and Joseph probably went through.

Some years ago, I saw a movie of what Mary and Joseph went through as the town folk found out that Mary was pregnant. I'm guessing that your home town may have treated them just like mine would have. Mary went off and spent three months with Elizabeth just to get out of town, and I'm guessing Joseph's carpenter business did not do well either.

Even after Jesus grew up and began his ministry, there were times when things didn't go well. At one point, Jesus in his home town was run out of town. "Can any good come from Nazareth?"

I'm guessing there is a special place in heaven for Mary and Joseph, don't you think?

By the way, I firmly believe there is a special place for all of you in heaven as well. Thanks so much for the many Merry Christmas Wishes you have given to Linda and me. You are a very caring and wonderful congregation. We are blessed to be part of Zion. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!


Ecumenical Worship

Voters Meeting

December 2nd, 2018

- Opening Prayer and Welcome
 - Mary's Magnificat
 - Think about what Joseph and Mary went through – how do they deal with it?
- Approval of Previous Meeting Minutes
 - Motion made, seconded, and approved
- CDC Report
 - Endured a change in management over the year
 - A plan in place to try to get it to run more smoothly
 - Committee meets every month to discuss and make decisions about CDC
- Finance Reports and 2018 Budget Proposal and approval
 - Church Budget
 - Contributions are holding – Amount in the budget is annualized (10 months) and it results in a higher number than last year's budget by over 9%. This is good news!
 - Regarding salaries and benefits, things are in line for how they've been since Pastor Larry has been with us. Reminded everyone that the budget would look a lot different if we had a full-time pastor who had the health insurance and retirement. As you can see on the Health and Pension line, we expected to pay almost \$20,000 for insurance and retirement benefits in 2016, the year Pastor Rick left
 - Larry will hopefully be taking course work for TEEM and any expense for that will come out of the separate scholarship fund we have. In addition, the CSC has awarded Larry a grant for \$5,000 to Wartburg for tuition expenses. More great news!
 - Other expenses remain comparable. Highlighted Mission Support on page two. When we combine the support we provide missions like Humanitri, Campus Ministry, St. Stephens Food Pantry, Heifer International, etc. with the designated amounts that are given to CSS, our mission support is 10.4% of our contributions. Also good news!
 - Questions?
 - Clarification requested on how the Good Samaritan Fund is working and who is getting the funds – Larry's discretion with discussion from the Council
 - Christian Education: Sunday School amount is \$0 and the budget states to use the reserve account (\$1400) – so instead of budgeting money to Sunday School, they will use the reserves for the 2019 year
 - Motion made to approve budget, seconded, and approved

- CDC Budget
 - Since July, the CDC Support Committee consisting of Kim Malin, Kristen Kinney, Janet Schaper, Pam Statler, and Pastor Larry have been meeting monthly to work closely with Courtney, the CDC Director. The summer program was very active and busy with lots of full-time school age children. They have settled into the school year and are doing lots of great things. They have revamped their curriculum and things are looking very positive for the kids
 - As you've seen in the monthly results the costs have exceeded the tuition revenue especially for the summer. The CDC Support committee, especially Janet, Pastor Larry, and Pam have worked closely with Courtney to come up with a plan for next year. That plan includes revised staff schedules for the school year and the summer that are in line with tuition amounts
 - At the same time, Janet Schaper has been working a couple days a week at least with Courtney to streamline administrative procedures and implement a new software program since the old program is being retired by the vendor
 - During the set up of the new system, new policies and procedures for billing practices have been developed and will be implemented beginning on January 1st, 2019
 - You may have heard in the news that the Ferguson Florissant School District is revamping, with some schools closing and grades moving between schools in the fall of 2019. They have also announced that they will have all day free preschool from age 3 up possibly at the same time. This may impact numbers of children in the CDC. We will monitor this closely and respond with the appropriate staffing levels and will keep you informed
 - We project that with the new billing policies and the new staffing schedules, we will break even during 2019. We will continue to monitor results closely each month and of course report those to the members. Courtney has done some really positive things in the CDC and has more things planned which include a more streamlined summer school age program
 - We understand how important it is to continue this ministry to families in our community, but we also take seriously the financial concerns and want the members to know that we watch things closely and support the CDC in every way we can. In that light, as Pastor Larry mentioned, we welcome volunteers of all kinds to help! Whether it's working with the children or helping in the office or with fundraisers. We are helping with the annual trivia night on March 30th and would welcome committee members and we are hosting a chili dinner for the

- CDC families on Wednesday, February 13th and could always use help with that.

- Member Care Ministry Report – Dorothy Kaiser
 - Great member care ministers that keep up with their members
 - Please let the Member Care Ministry know what is going on if there is anything going on
- Property Report, including update on church safety issue – Sue Dunham
 - Cameras have been installed upstairs and in the sanctuary – working on getting them in on the playground in the spring
 - Redid the ceilings in the multi-purpose room – no curtains on the windows – enjoying the sunlight
 - New WIFI and stable ethernet so the phones should be working in tip top shape
 - Looking for a new property manager for 2019
- Update on Little Church Women’s Center
 - Renovations complete and at least 2 women living there
 - Storage bins will be going away soon and sod will likely be put down possibly in the spring
 - Church still has to maintain the outside of the property so people can contribute to the AAU through designated contributions to help us maintain that property – if you want to give them donations directly, you can set that up with them
 - \$75,000 we designated to them has been distributed
 - Survey of the property was completed and it was discovered that City of Ferguson owns the property down the hill to the Whistle Stop- it actually stops before the fence line
 - Requested a boundary adjustment to the fence line – discovered that it actually needed to be deeded over to us from the city of Ferguson – Waiting to hear from the city council about whether or not they are going to give us the land or expect us to pay for it
 - Discussion came up about not buying it from the city if they make us pay for it but understanding that the city would be responsible for maintaining it – but we will make a case for them to just give us the property
- Worship Committee Report – Gail Voss
 - Working with Larry through the seasons of the church year
 - Theme for the seasons
 - Looking to participate with Good Shepherd for their mid-week advent services

- Working with the alter guild to make duties a little easier
- Worship Survey was done in August – changes have been made
 - Peace in the beginning of the service, blessing at the end of service, ushers lighting candles at the beginning of service and have present children extinguish them with the help of the communion servers, experimenting with the unleavened bread instead of wafers, change up the children's message
- Community Committee Report – Dorothy Kaiser
 - Possibly doing a warming tree after Christmas in January – looking for Coats and gloves and scarfs to hang on the at the corner of Carson and Clark
- Service Committee Report – Pam Statler
 - Successfully completed God's Work our Hands and served Coffee in the morning,
 - Big thing is the Holiday Hang Out – Hot cocoa, Smore's, Fire Pits, tree decorating – December 22nd
